Making a Select Committee Submission Frequently asked questions



If you're thinking about making a select committee submission and have questions about what this means and how you do it, you might find your answer below.

What is a select committee submission and why should I make one?

A select committee submission is your opportunity to share how you feel about the "Principles of the Treaty of Waitangi Bill" with the Government.

You'll send your written submission to the select committee, which is a committee made up of members of the Government. The select committee will read your submission and tell the Government what people think about the Bill.

If enough people make submissions, the Government might decide to change or even abandon the Bill.

Your submission, along with others, will be considered by the select committee as they develop their own views on the Bill. It will also form part of the formal record of the Bill's development.



What should I write in my submission?

Your submission is your statement to the Government on the Bill. You might want to tell them how the Bill makes you feel and how it affects you.

Is an attack on Ngāi Tahu rangatiratanga, the Ngāi Tahu Settlement

and Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

- Is the worst breach of Te Tiriti o Waitangi of our generation.
- Restricts our Te Tiriti o Waitangi rights, especially our Article II rights.

When do I need to make my submission?

Anytime before 11.59pm on 7 January 2025 – so if you're ready now, you can make your submission right away!

I'm under 18. Can I still make a submission?

Yes! Anyone of any age can make a submission. If you are under 18, this is a great way to start getting involved and getting your voice heard.

How do I make my submission?

You'll need to write your thoughts in English or te reo Māori and <u>upload what you've</u> written here or post it to:
